Please know your time commitment and labor were greatly appreciated.



Dear Club Officer,

I am proud of what we have accomplished thus far in our year of leadership and I congratulate you for the important role you have played in our achievements. Together, we have begun to change the way that the world thinks about Lions Clubs International and the way that Lions think about themselves.

We have not changed our fundamental nature. We are and will always be among the most active and involved members of our communities, dedicated to serving our home towns and the world. But in keeping with changing lifestyles, we have become more flexible and responsive in the way we go about our business. We have opened our clubs to family members and helped invigorate them with fresh ideas and the energy of youth. Today a Lions Club meeting may take place at any time, on any day in a restaurant, a meeting hall or a member's home with children and teenagers present and participating.

I am happy to report that since January, more than 74,466 members – more than 5.7 percent of all Lions – have been certified as a member of a family unit. Most significantly, nearly 10,000 of these are **new** members – Lions who might never have considered club membership without our new family-oriented focus. I am especially pleased about the influx of women into our clubs. Through March, more than 32,300 women have been added worldwide and they bring with them an enormous potential for new service.

Perhaps just as important as this new flexibility, Lions Clubs are raising their profiles in their home communities and among their fellow Lions. Clubs have taken advantage of networking opportunities presented by active and well-connected new members to reach out to even more people who might serve as Lions. Many have become reliable and trustworthy news sources for local media outlets. Some have invited influential citizens to be a part of their meeting programs and sponsored forums and events of interest to the entire community.

When I called for a “new paradigm” for Lions Clubs International at the beginning of this year, I included the need for better communications and public relations at the local level. I did this because I know the power that a story can have in any organization. The stories of Melvin Jones' leadership and Helen Keller's challenge to Lions have become a treasured part of our heritage. Stories are also the best way

to teach and learn. The success story of one club can provide an example to other clubs in its district or even inspire the achievements of another club on the other side of the world.
